PLEASE FORGIVE ME

My family knows by now that the events that happen in our lives will likely one day end up in a sermon. I know some don't like that, but it happens and I try very hard not to delve too deeply. Most of the time they accept the fact that I've told on them or me, and we move on. But sometimes, rarely, but sometimes, I get a story wrong (unintentionally, of course), and I am reminded that it "didn't happen that way at all." And there is emotion attached to those words.

A couple of weeks ago, I shared a story about Jodi and her car and my reaction to that event. The point I was making was the hesitation we have in wanting to tell what we have done, because we don't know how someone will react. (Much like this article.) I should have stopped at her telling me. But instead, I went forward and shared my reaction of care and concern. Thankfully, and somewhat surprisingly, Jodi did not call me out then and there at that moment.

She graciously (and sternly) corrected me on how that story transpired. As she said, "You didn't ask how I was. You knew I was fine." Then it all came rushing back, and I realized, she was right. I remember the first words I said when I saw the car and I cannot write all of them here, but I am sure you can imagine. It began with "What" and ended with an exclamation point. You know, she was right. I didn't tell the story correctly and I am publicly correcting that wrong. Please forgive me.

Since that day, many have heard me say that I was wrong and have heard Jodi's side of the story. Since that day, and even that day, we could go back and laugh a little and playfully pick at each other. It was a minor thing in the big scope of life. But, I felt it was important to correct that mistake. First and foremost because it is the right thing to do. But then I was reminded that it is the Lenten season and what better time to take a look in the mirror.

I know so often we think about giving up or even taking on something for Lent. But I think Lent is also a time for serious introspection of how we live our life, how we treat each other, and even how we treat our relationship with God. What things do we get right, and what things do we get wrong? And believe me, I get a lot of things wrong (not just stories about my family). And when we realize we have done something wrong, should we not try to rectify the situation by putting our egos behind us and saying, "Please forgive me"? Or changing the way we act to better show to whom we belong?

I am fully aware that Lent is not just about repentance, but I do think it is one facet of the season. I think it was summed up really well in 2021, when Pope Francis shared his suggestions for fasting during Lent:

Fast from hurting words and say kind words.	Fast from complaintsand contemplate simplicity.
Fast from sadnessand be filled with gratitude.	Fast from pressuresand be prayerful.
Fast from angerand be filled with patience.	Fast from bitternessand fill your hearts with joy.
Fast from pessimismand be filled with hope.	Fast from selfishnessand be compassionate to others.
Fast from worriesand have trust in God.	Fast from grudgesand be reconciled.

Fast from words...and be silent so you can listen.

It is so easy for us to forget the call that God has placed upon our lives to live faithful in our words and actions. I don't think for one minute we intend on hurting someone, but sometimes it happens. And when it does, how will we respond? Will we choose to ignore our failure or refuse to admit we have done anything wrong? Or, will we be humble enough to look at the person before us, or the God above us, and say, "Please forgive me"? It is amazing when someone says, "Yes, I forgive you," and when God says, "I do too."
